Structure de la phrase

Mots interrogatifs	auxiliaire	sujet	verbe	complément / divers
Where	do	you	work	on Saturdays?
What	can	you	see	over there?
Which (shop)	does	he	work	in?

Attention ! Dans une phrase interrogative, rejetez la préposition en fin de phrase.

Ex. : What are you looking at?
Who are you talking to?
Where is she coming from?

• Lorsque le pronom interrogatif **who, what** ou **which** est sujet, il n'y a pas d'auxiliaire au présent ni au prétérit simple.

Ex. : Who comes first? *Qui vient le premier ?*
What happened next? *Qu'est-ce qui est arrivé ensuite ?*
